Though we continue to be challenged by difficult global economic conditions, I am pleased to report that 2012 was a year of improved financial results and broadening impact for SERRV.

We were able to increase our sales, reduce our inventory and debt and generate a meaningful surplus which will be invested in future growth. As a result of our closer partnership with MarketPlace: Handwork of India, another nonprofit fair trade organization, total revenues were well in excess of ten million dollars. Most importantly we were able to support many more families in their efforts to build sustainable lives.

Our purchases of fairly traded handmade and food products increased by more than 10% to \$3,673,170 in 2012 and we implemented a wide range of development projects which benefited many of our partners.

All of this was possible because of the ongoing support of our tens of thousands of customers, donors, volunteers, and supporters as well as an extremely dedicated staff and Board of Directors, for which we are extremely grateful.

Building a National Fair Trade Retail Network

In September 2012, more than 25 store managers and fair traders gathered in Madison, Wisconsin to attend our inaugural Retailer Retreat. Our goal was to offer practical support to retail store managers who are dedicated to building the market for fair trade here in the US. Based on the feedback received from participants, it was a resounding success!

We were grateful to work with friends and partners to make this event a success. Several sessions were facilitated by Candi Horton, an experienced store manager who volunteered her time and skills. The Executive Director of the Fair Trade Federation, Renee Bowers, talked about the broader fair trade movement in North America. And Pushpika Freitas, President of MarketPlace: Handwork of India, shared inspirational stories about the impact of fair trade on the women artisans they work with. We were also

fortunate to be joined by two designers from SERRV artisan partners in Asia. Swagata Ghosh of Sasha Fair Trade in India and Sunita Maharjan of ACP in Nepal added their unique perspectives on fair trade to the conversation.

The information was very useful to all of the participants and the evaluations were overwhelmingly positive. After attending, one manager said, "These were tools I knew I needed in my tool belt, I just didn't know how to use them effectively before." Another participant commented, "Great ideas that will help my store increase sales!"

Our 2nd Annual Retailer Retreat will be held September 22-25, 2013 in Madison, Wisconsin. We are already looking forward to it!

Development Highlights Some of our 2012 projects:

Jewelry training in Africa

One of our partners, Delta Survie, is based in Mali and has been negatively affected by recent civil unrest. Due to the instability, designer Frederic Alcantara met with artisans for a product development workshop in neighboring Burkina Faso. This workshop resulted in a SERRV order of beautiful new jewelry pieces and vital income for the women artisans.

Building better websites in Nepal

SERRV's graphic designer traveled to Nepal to work with four of our partners on improvements to their websites so they will be more appealing to potential customers. She also led classes on photography, web layout, and design for all members of Fair Trade Group Nepal.

Learning about the US market

We welcomed Sushila Ashok and Sister Silvia Aranha from St. Mary's, India, a SERRV partner of over 20 years, for an educational visit on product design here in the United States. Sushila demonstrated her excellent embroidery skill for customers, volunteers, friends, and staff.

ArtisanWork re-launch

SERRV offers ArtisanWork.org as a free resource for artisans around the world. It features up-to-date information on product development, marketing, export documentation, and building a strong business. In 2012, we renovated this website to provide a more user-friendly experience, so it can better serve our worldwide partners.

New Partnerships in 2012

SERRV welcomed two new Indian partners, Conserve and Noah's Ark, in 2012. Conserve strives to improve the lives of marginalized people living near landfills by building schools in their communities and providing income by upcycling waste materials into handcrafts. Noah's Ark responds to the needs of artisans who maintain traditional skills through employment and development projects. We also reconnected with La Siembra, a worker-owned cooperative in Canada that offers fairly traded, organic food from Latin America.



People Supporting People

SERRV is committed to listening to our partners and helping them overcome the challenges of being a small business in a global market. Recently, VillageWorks in Cambodia approached us for help with product designs that would better serve the ever-changing popular trends in the US market. We were thankful to have experienced designer, consultant and educator, Frank Millero, on our board, who graciously volunteered his time to support this project.

Frank was joined by professional photographer Joseph De Leo, who is known for his work on cookbooks and high-profile magazines. Together, they traveled to Cambodia to assist VillageWorks with product development

and to document their work and life through photography and video.

Over the course of three weeks, Frank assisted VillageWorks to create new product samples, review design details, and develop new fabric ideas. He was able to develop 50 new product samples, some of which were launched on SERRV's website in fall 2012. Following the partnership, SERRV saw a noticeable jump in popularity of the newly redesigned product line. They went from having no products in our top sellers list to three! We are inspired by VillageWorks' progress in their product development and we are thankful for Frank's dedication to this project.
